Objective of PE Grant Spending 2019 - 2020

To effectively use the PE Sports Grant to raise the profile and outcomes for children in PE, Sport and physical activity across the school.

Record and Impact of Spending for 2019 – 2020 PE Sport Grant.

Please note that this impact statement predominately reflects the period from September 2019 to March 2020, although there is some reference to impact during the period of partial school closure.

<p>Increase in participation rates in such activities as games, dance, gymnastics, swimming and athletics</p> <p>Curriculum</p>	<p>The children are enthusiastic about PE lessons. The PE and sport grant has enabled us to develop a program of dance training with the aim of giving each teacher an opportunity to work alongside and observe a specialist dance teacher work with a class over a period of six lessons. Each year a group of six teachers are chosen to work with a specialist from Trinity Laban in order to strengthen their expertise. They have also provided us with a set of plans linked to the geography or History topic that taught that term. Teachers who have had this training now feel empowered to plan and teach lessons that aim to keep children active and engaged while teaching skills which enable children to progress rapidly in their learning. Following the dance training, children were asked in a questionnaire about their experiences during the lessons. They commented on the skills that they had learned and their enjoyment of the lessons as they progressed. Teachers also commented that it impacted positively on their confidence to plan and teach dance lessons.</p> <p>We continued to work with Independent PE consultants Dave McLaren and Graham Curtis. Children attended tournaments until January of this year, but tournaments were then suspended due to coronavirus.</p> <p>We also employed a hockey coach to teach a number of children to play hockey. This was particularly aimed at girls who were PPG in year 4 and 6; we have now extended the provision to boys as well which has proved very successful. The children are very enthusiastic about these lessons and their hockey skills continue to improve. We have been unable to send Gordonbrock children to swimming training this year due to coronavirus, and the year 5 and 6 Lewisham Swimming Gala which we always attend was cancelled.</p> <p>We have an exceptional Teachsport Sports Coach who has inspired the children through his teaching and he recognises the importance of training children to reach their full potential. During the pandemic we employed him to teach all day. This will continue into the new academic year.</p>	<p>£2,283.15</p> <p>£1260</p> <p>£5,800.00</p>
<p>Extra-Curricular</p>	<p>The children were enthusiastic about being included in clubs and tournaments. We took every opportunity to attend tournaments and festivals. We had a boys' and a girls' football team who will played in the Lewisham League. This year, the girls' team came fourth in the Lewisham Football League and the boys' team came second in the league. In 2019 we also trained a boys' team from our year 4 and 5 classes. Many of these boys will go on to play in the year 5 and 6 team if and when the season begins in 2020-21.</p> <p>We take every opportunity to encourage children to attend sporting clubs outside school time. Until partial school closure, we ran clubs at the end of the school day, which were tailored to include children from all age groups and to interest children with varying skills.</p>	<p>£4,425</p>
<p>Participation and success in</p>	<p>We selected both a boys' and a girls' football team who attended weekly training sessions after school with a coach and played fortnightly in the Lewisham Football League at Blackheath when the league began.</p>	<p>£1,536</p>

<p>competitive school sports</p> <p><i>(Includes increased numbers of pupils participating in an increased range of competitive opportunities as well as success in competitions)</i></p>	<p>We take great pride in our football teams and each year we provide them with a football kit. This is partly funded by the Friends of Gordonbrock.</p> <p>We have been able to attend a limited number of tournaments outside school during 2019-2020. However, we continue to be a member of the sports family run by Dave McClaren and Graham Curtis and until we can once again attend tournaments outside school we will be involved in the intra- to inter-sports challenges that they set us.</p> <p>Our yearly Sports Day was unfortunately cancelled this year.</p>	<p>£55.11</p> <p>See above</p>
<p>How much more inclusive the physical education curriculum has become</p>	<p>This year, we used the PE funding to run CPD sessions in dance and we had a specialist teacher from Laban to run CPD sessions. She was able to help teachers to use different method to plan a scheme of work and as a result the staff team are building up a bank of plans to use while teaching dance and to share with other teachers in their phase group.</p> <p>We funded and will continue to fund equipment provided for the bubbles of children during play-time and lunch-time breaks. Our lunch-time supervisors include the sports coach and he has tailored the boxes for bubbles so that the sports equipment is varied and is suited to the skills of the children in that bubble.</p>	<p>See above</p> <p>£1,007.03</p>
<p>Growth in the range of provisional and alternative sporting activities</p>	<p>Funds were used to employ the sports coach from Teachsport. He runs all outdoor PE sessions for children from year 2 upwards. The teachers also developed their own knowledge and teaching skills as they work alongside specialists. The coach assessed the children's skills at the end of each term. We use these assessments to inform areas to be worked on in the following term. We are able to target these areas for each class. Teachers are informed of areas to concentrate on at the beginning of each term.</p> <p>Our family of schools ran an intra to inter competition each term. Children were encouraged to have a go at a new skill such as speed bounce or chest push, or to practise a skill such as skipping. We then recorded timed results and celebrated successes within school. These results were sent off to Graham Curtis who compared our results with results from schools within our family and he gave out certificates to the overall winners.</p> <p>Each morning, the children were encouraged to begin the day with a period of movement and we pay for a provision called 5-A-Day which all the classes could access. This was available to the children at home during the lockdown period.</p> <p>A year 5 teacher took her class to the Lewisham Live Dance Festival. This was a great success and the performance was praised by a member of the Trinity Laban team.</p>	<p>See above</p> <p>£252.00</p> <p>£50</p>
<p>Partnership work on physical education with other schools and other local partners</p>	<p>Once a term, the PE Coordinator met with Graham Curtis, Dave McClaren and coordinators from twelve other schools in the borough who belong to a family of schools. At that meeting we planned the tournaments for the next term and shared good practice from other schools. This was very useful as this practice can then be incorporated into our planning.</p> <p>The sports grant contributed to the cost of year 4 swimming lessons.</p>	<p>See above</p>
<p>Links with other subjects that contribute to pupils' overall achievement and their greater spiritual, moral, social and cultural skills (SMSC)</p>	<p>The grant gave us the opportunity to provide equipment for the playground so that the children are active and engaged during playtime and lunch time. The PE Coordinator holds assemblies with all year groups to talk about the cost of equipment, to emphasise looking after it. This was linked to the British value of Citizenship.</p> <p>We participate in the Bikeability, 'Cycling Proficiency', programme in year 6.</p> <p>We take every opportunity to celebrate achievement in sports and present out pupils with medals at the end of the year and we also have a sports boy and a sports girl of the year.</p>	<p>See above</p> <p>No cost.</p> <p>£49.45</p>
<p>Review the impact that the funding has had on other factors</p>	<p>PE has a high profile in Gordonbrock School; success is celebrated at every opportunity, from children making progress in a class to teams winning at a tournament. Children are encouraged to reflect on their own steps for improvement and to look out for good practice in others and comment on it and ways forward to improve. Teachers always exhibit and model a positive attitude to health and wellbeing and during PE lesson, especially the warm up, children are encouraged to think about the importance of keeping healthy.</p>
