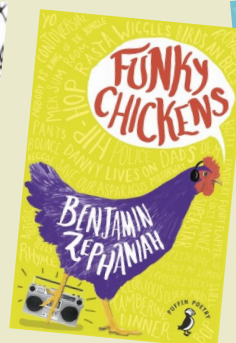
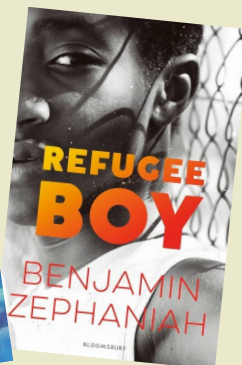
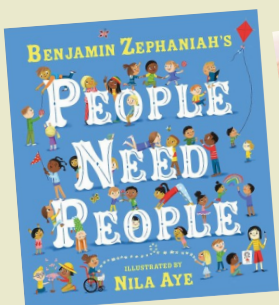

GORDONBROCK X BRYAN CAVE LEIGHTON PAISNER

To mark **Black History Month 2023**, a group of our year 6 artists paid homage to inspirational Black females in the law profession and beyond in a **collaboration project with law firm BCLP (Bryan Cave Leighton Paisner)**.

Through the vibrant strokes of acrylic, the young artists brought to life the strength, wisdom and resilience of these trailblazing women, who have paved the way for justice and equality.

Backgrounds to their portrait were inspired by the striking artwork of American quilt-artist, **Bisa Butler**, who combines vibrant colours and patterned fabrics to reimagine and celebrate narratives of Black life.

Portraits included: **Funke Abimbola MBE**—a Nigerian businesswoman and lawyer. She advocates for diversity across UK society with a specific focus on the legal profession. **Jessikah Inaba**—the UK's first blind and Black female barrister in London. Jessikah spent her childhood in Lewisham. **Debo Nwazuru**—chair and founder of the Black Lawyer's Directory (BLD). BLD launched in 2006 with the aim of highlighting and promoting diversity in law. **Alexandra Wilson**—a barrister, and author of *In Black and White: A Young Barrister's Story of Race and Class in a Broken Justice System*. **Dame Linda Dobbs**—a retired High Court judge in England and Wales who served from 2004 to 2013. Dobbs was the first non-white person to be appointed to the senior judiciary of England and Wales. **I. Stephanie Boyce**—a British solicitor. From March 2021 to October 2022, she was President of the Law Society. **Mavis Best**—Mavis Best and a group of Black women from Lewisham lobbied the police and the government to scrap the sus law. **Dr. Gifty Edila**—the first Black director of law in a council in England and Wales.

The pupils were invited to the BCLP offices in the City of London to see their work exhibited, met with staff for a mentoring session and enjoyed a corporate lunch. A huge thank you to Lloyd, Georgia, Manuela, Rudrani and the catering team at BCLP, and to Miss White for supporting the pupils with their portraits and Deniz for joining us on the trip.



SCHOOL ORCHESTRA UPDATE

SKETCHBOOK DEVELOPMENT

As part of our ArtsMark journey, we are developing our Art curriculum further, including how we use sketchbooks to develop children's knowledge and skills, and to capture process. We want sketchbooks to embody a journey of exploration, experimentation and artistic growth.

Year 4, as part of their portraiture work this term, have used their sketchbooks effectively, to create their own sanctuary of personal expression, hone skills and document inspiration, fostering a deeper connection between pupils and their artistic endeavors.



MUSIC MAKING IN YEAR 5

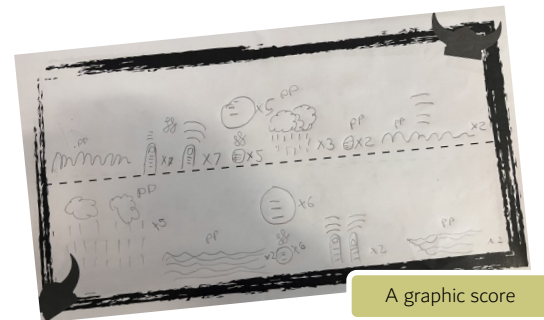
This term, our young musicians in Year 5 have focused in on becoming composers! Linked with their topic for the term, Anglo Saxons and Vikings, every child created a Viking drumming battle.

Firstly, our musicians created polyrhythms set to words - Let's go raiding, let's go raiding; Viking's watch out; and Long Boat. These different phrases were set to individual rhythms that the children then mixed together to create their own rhythmic pattern.

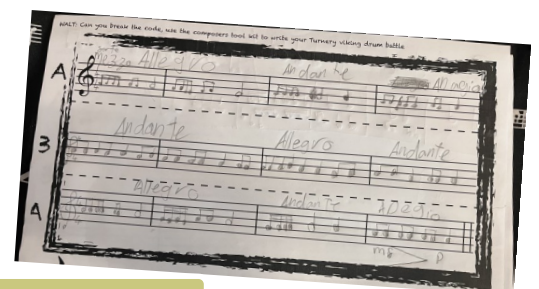
Our next stage was composing a graphic score. A graphic score uses pictures to represent music on the page. This progresses on from Year 2 where they focused in on Anna Clyne, a professional musician who uses graphic scores in her composition. The Night Ferry (a piece from the model music curriculum). Every child in Year 5 then added in a range of dynamic symbols from forté to piano.

Finally, we cracked the musical code by seeing how many different rhythms fitted within four beats of music as our young musicians wrote a new composition on the staff for their drum battle. In pairs, they created a turnery piece of music (this is an A section, a new B section and a repeated A section—for example, Twinkle Twinkle Little Star). All young musicians drew a treble clef, time signature, created accurate compositions, added in a range of tempo markings from Allegro to Presto and new dynamic markings including crescendos, diminuendos to ff/pp.

During our Music sessions, we also learnt a range of Viking songs in two-part harmony, listened to a range of dramatic classical music and performed some of our work in a class assembly. Our young composers in Year 5 should be very proud of themselves!

PROGRESSION IN THE TEACHING OF COLOUR THEORY FOR A YOUNG ARTIST AT GORDONBROCK



EYFS

In EYFS, our youngest artists **experiment with colour**. They explore, use and refine a variety of artistic effects to **express their ideas and feelings**.

Y1

In Year 1, artists learn to **name primary (red, blue and yellow) and secondary colours (purple, orange and green)**.



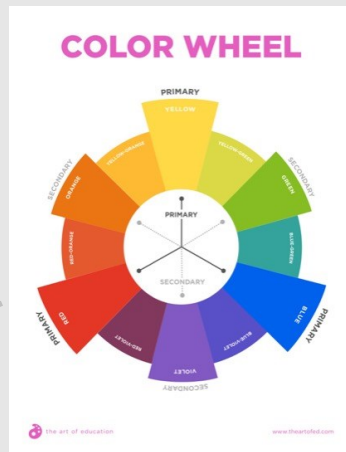
The colors I choose support the narrative I am trying to tell about the subject. The colors I choose support the emotion I observe and feel.

Y2

In Year 2, our young artists learn to **mix paint to create all secondary colours (green, orange and purple)**. They practise **mixing and matching colours, predicting outcomes**. We also expect them to be able to **make brown paint**, and make tints by adding white and tones by adding black.

Y3

In Year 3, artists learn to **mix paint accurately** and know where the primary and secondary colours sit on the colour wheel. They will practise **creating a background colour using a wash**.

In Year 4 through to 6, our budding artists learn to **create all the colours they need**, and their **knowledge of colour theory is used to create mood in their paintings**. As they progress through these year groups, artists **develop their ability to express their emotions accurately through their paintings**.
