Football - Girls' Team: Champions Cup

Due to the team's success in finishing 1st in their league, the girls' team qualified to take part in this year's Champion's Cup. This competition was a one-day event whereby the teams that finished in the top four in the two leagues faced off against each other, with the top two from both groups facing off in the semi-final. The first match was against Holbeach, a team that we should beat as we have been very successful against them in the past. However, the girls started slowly. In a game of not many clear chances and scrappy play, the team ended the game 0-0. Not an ideal start as we knew we had to now win both the remaining games to have a chance of progressing to out of the group stage. POTM was Indiya for her work ethic and determination.



The second fixture was against Stillness, one of our fiercest competitors and one that in three previous games had ended 0-0—though a draw here would be a disaster. In a complete reverse of the first game, the girls were in control from the start and played out of their skins with some fantastic defending and attacking moves. 
Imagine

This week, we have been looking at representation and integration; we watched a video called The Color of Space, where we learn about the importance to see yourself, to **DREAM BIG**—linked to our vision statement: We are highly aspirational for all our children and we do whatever it take us to enable them to overcome barriers to their learning.

This linked to the Article 5 where we, parents and educators, set up the best guidance and environments for them to become their best self.

Article 5: Family Guidance as Children Develop

Governments should let families and communities guide their children so that, as they grow up, they learn to use their rights in the best way. The more children grow, the less guidance they will need.

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New technologies inspire children to be creative, communicate and learn. However, while the internet is a great resource, it is important that children and young people are protected from the risks they may encounter.


